World Peace 2000 Peace 2000 Caravan

In April 1996, 23 people from 5 countries met at the University for Peace in Costa Rica to form the World Peace 2000 Network. This meeting was coordinated by Lois Nicolai, Executive Director of World Citizen Diplomats, in collaboration with Dr. Robert Muller, Chancellor of the University for Peace, and Rodrigo Carazo, former President of Costa Rica. Exactly 6 months later people from nearly 25 countries met at the United Nations for World Peace 2000's first global conference. One of the attendees was Chris Hildred, who had, synchronistically, founded World Peace 2000 in the United Kingdom in January, 1996. Since then, the World Peace 2000 coalition has grown, united in the desire to use the planned celebrations of the year 2000 as a way to unite the world to strive for peace on earth.

World Citizen Diplomats' Peace 2000 Caravan is helping to spread the World Peace 2000 message of hope as it journeys throughout the world, dialoguing with communities, and working to build bridges of understanding and peace, one person at a time. After two successful tours, the first across the United States, and the second, across Canada up to Alaska, then down the West Coast to southern California, the Peace 2000 Caravan is now making preparations for its European tour, beginning in April, 1998. Letter from the Editor

A few years ago, in a meeting with the executive committee of The Lifebridge Foundation, one of our current grantees expressed his interest in the concept that the sun, our solar system's central star, might possess a kind of "consciousness". This could have been a rather bizarre statement to make in other forums, but not at The Lifebridge Foundation.

The executive committee was intrigued. Indeed, so was the entire Board of Directors. So much so as a matter of fact, that in June, 1997 on the summer solstice, we sponsored a conference to discuss that very concept.

The grantee in question is Dr. Rupert Sheldrake. Dr. Sheldrake came to the attention of many in this country recently with the broadcast of the PBS series A Glorious Accident. His controversial theories of "morphic resonance" and "formative causation" had already made him very well-known in Europe.

The conference on the summer solstice, which came to be called "The Sun Conference", brought together a group of people representing many different viewpoints: educators, scientists, esotericists, poets, and philosophers. It was convened in South Devon, England and the result was both fascinating and illuminating, to which the adjoining article by Dr. Sheldrake will testify.

The Lifebridge Foundation doesn't shrink from the controversial, we are actually drawn to it. After all, controversial concepts more often than not eventually become accepted reality. It takes fearless, and hopefully, joyous exploration to create the future.

A sign hangs on our office wall that says, "Only those who can see the invisible can do the impossible." This is perhaps the defining principle of creativity itself - envisioning the potential and then manifesting it. The organizations and the individuals with whom we collaborate exemplify that creative principle, and in The Bridging Tree we'd like to give them some space!

Is the Sun Conscious? by Rupert Sheldrake, Ph.D.

Over the summer solstice of 1997, thirteen people of diverse background and discipline met in a secluded valley in the west of England to discuss the consciousness of the Sun. One participant, John O'Donohue, an Irish poet and visionary, arrived with the misunderstanding that we meant *human* consciousness of the Sun in science, myth and art. When he discovered we meant the consciousness of the Sun itself, he later confessed he was convinced that this would be a non-starter. In fact, it proved to be the most wonderful starter to all our imaginations. No one is used to thinking about the consciousness of the Sun. The subject is rarely raised, still less discussed. There are no experts. If we want to think about this subject, we're on our own.

As Kevin McCarthy, a school teacher, pointed out, young children almost invariably draw the sun with a face and a smile. Its consciousness is not discussed but simply accepted. And the face has eyes: the Sun does not only emit light but also sees. Similar imagery of the Sun is found in all civilisations including Egypt, Babylonia, Greece, Rome, India, and in Christendom.

On the other hand, since the seventeenth century, science has portrayed the universe as inanimate. The Sun is simply a star like other stars, burning up fuel. Celestial bodies, like all other bodies, are essentially mechanical. In modern scientific thought, the Sun cannot be conscious. The question does not even arise.

For materialists, our consciousness is nothing other than the activity of our brains. From this point of view, since consciousness is confined to human brains (and is perhaps present to a lesser degree in higher animals) then neither the Sun nor the stars, nor the Earth, nor anything within it except man and perhaps some animals can have consciousness. The Sun, Gaia and indeed the entire universe cannot be conscious because they do not have brains.

Most materialists suppose that the complex electromagnetic rhythms in our brains provide the interface between brain activity and consciousness. Could rhythmic patterns of electromagnetic activity likely be associated with the consciousness of the Sun? One of the starting points of our discussions was the recent discovery of the extraordinary dynamism of the Sun. The eleven year sun-spot cycles, linked to reversals of the magnetic polarity of the Sun are well known. But the sun has recently been found to reverberate, like a gong, to over *a million* pitches, each bouncing back and forth through the different layers of the interior of the Sun, with the resonance being determined by their pitch. As well as this extraordinarily complex spatio-temporal pattern of vibration, there are the oscillations, perturbations, and

harmonics of the electromagnetic field associated with the phenomena on the surface of the Sun such as sun-spots. Magnetic storms on the sun are so intense that they can disrupt radio communications, cause homing pigeons to lose their way, and in other ways affect what happens on Earth.

Bernard Carr, a cosmologist at Queen Mary College, London, described some of the ways these investigations are being carried out through an international programme called SOHO (the Solar and Heliospheric Observatory) with a special satellite positioned at the point of equal gravity between the Earth and the Sun and orbiting around the Sun together with the Earth, permitting continuous examinations and observations of the Sun's activity. Meanwhile an earth-based network of observatories, GONG (the Global Oscillation Network Group), is also tracking the Sun's vibratory activities 24 hours a day, overcoming the interruption of observations by nightfall by means of observatories at different longitudes.

Perhaps the Sun can think in a way barely imaginable to our more limited power of thinking, its thoughts interfacing with its ever changing patterns of vibratory activity. In this way, it is scientifically imaginable that the Sun could be conscious.

The scientists among us were more interested in such arguments than some of the other participants. Some, like esotericist and educator Ida Urso, said they had never doubted for a moment that the Sun was conscious. They thought of the whole universe as conscious; and if there is consciousness in everything, why not the Sun?

Inevitably, it was not long before we found ourselves discussing what was meant by consciousness. Christopher Clarke, a physicist, was opposed to any attempt to see consciousness as a kind of add-on extra, somehow fitted into a world of autonomous physical processes in autonomous space-time. Consciousness, in his view, is somehow fundamental or innate to physical processes and these processes are not separable from space-time itself. Space and time are not absolutes, as they were for Newton, but bound up with everything else, including consciousness.

On the morning of the summer solstice itself, most of us set off at 4 AM in the dim grey light and in steady rain. Our hopes of seeing the sunrise seemed remote. We climbed up across the fields to a nearby hilltop, the site of an ancient Iron Age fort, the Blackdown Rings. As we entered the circular enclosure, we passed through a simple ecremony involving the elements of earth, air, fire and water and leapt over a mid-summer fire. We then climbed up to the highest point, and there miraculously, in the Northeastern horizon was a window in the cloud over Dartmoor. And there we saw the Sun rise. The full moon shone between the rain clouds in the west. And as the Sun rose there was a rainbow behind us. After this extraordinary display. Jill Purce led us in a chant.

When we started our discussions again later that day, more questions came to mind. We thought about the Sun's relationship with the other stars. Do stars communicate with each other? Can

they do so through gravitational effects and electro-magnetic radiation, not only in the visible range, but through x-rays, radio waves, and particle emissions? Or can they also communicate "telepathically"? Does the galaxy itself have a mind at a yet higher level, or is it simply a kind of collective consciousness of the individual star-minds within it? If the Sun has habits, like all other living organisms, then these habits will probably be unconscious, as habits usually are. Thus the Sun may have an unconscious mind. And perhaps stars have a collective unconscious. By this time everyone was really having fun and we were so far beyond any known bounds of academic respectability we all felt quite free.

On the last day of our gathering we came to the question of intergalactic telepathy. The scientific starting point for this particular discussion was that any messages that traveled at the speed of light would take billions of light years to reach distant galaxies, and the same again for the message to return to our galaxy. Even within this galaxy, light based or radio based communication would be very slow. Our galaxy, the Milky Way, is over 100,000 light years across. So for a radio signal to reach from one solar system on one side of the galaxy to one on the other side, and for the message to return, it would take 200,000 years. It is unlikely that any human type civilisation would be around in 200,000 years time, and even if it were, the record-keeping system would have to be immaculate if the original message to which this was the reply, were not to be forgotten. Only through some form of communication vastly faster than light, or through some other kind of non-local linkage, could conscious communication occur within and between galaxies.

For me, one of the most astonishing thoughts was rather casually advanced by David Lorimer, director of the Scientific and Medical Network. He told us that in August, 1997 the followers of the Bulgarian teacher Peter Dhunov, would be gathering in Bulgaria to commune with the spirit of their deceased master and other illuminated beings who would be meeting *in the Sun* at the same time!

Satish Kumar told us of the traditional Indian belief that the departed spirits of enlightened human beings pass first into the light of the Sun and then to dimensions or realms beyond; the Sun was a kind of gateway through which human consciousness could move after bodily death.

As our time together drew to a close our minds were boggling. It was the most stimulating and enjoyable few days of discussion I have attended in many years. But needless to say, we came to no firm conclusions about the consciousness of the Sun.

I for one am very grateful for this blessed time we spent together, and to The Lifebridge Foundation for making it possible.

Proposing a Youth Assembly for the United Nations by Benjamin Quinto

We met Benjamin Quinto, age 19, in the spring of 1997 at a meeting of the World Peace 2000 Network, organized by Lois Nicolai of World Citizen Diplomats and held at Princeton University. We were immediately impressed and even amazed by his intelligence and his straightforward sincerity and optimism. Benjamin currently serves on the Board of Directors and Youth Advisory Board of One Day Foundation. He has spoken internationally about the concerns of youth in general and the proposal for a UN Youth Assembly in particular.

In November, 1997, Benjamin attended the State of The World Forum in San Francisco, then served on a panel on Youth Engagement and Voting in Los Angeles, hosted by the Arselyn Foundation.

He wrote the following article especially for The Lifebridge Foundation website and for the newsletter of The Lifebridge Foundation,

The Bridging Tree.



Early last year, I developed an interest in the United Nations and its peace-keeping mission. An eagerness grew in me to get involved on any level and this eagerness opened a door for me to attend a meeting of a United Nations NGO (non-governmental organization). In that meeting

I had the opportunity to meet some extraordinary individuals, some of whom have been with the UN for over fifty years.

At the age of seventeen, I was the youngest attendee at that meeting and this fact was obvious from the minute I stepped into the room. Though it did not particularly bother me, I was kind of saddened to see that no other young people were in attendance.

As a result, during the following months I embarked upon researching youth involvement in the United Nations. My findings were a disappointment. Although a United Nations Youth Unit had been established in 1946, to this day, no youth have been involved in the work of the United Nations on an ongoing basis. How could that be?

Determined to find out why, I examined the history and structure of the UN, perusing General Assembly resolutions and other document to find references to youth. I also read up on related areas such as youth oriented governmental and non-governmental organizations working with or associated with the United Nations. I found that although the UN has sponsored the occasional youth event or summit, there have never been any youth continually active within the UN structure. Furthermore there is no system that facilitates or encourages their direct participation.

Learning this, I clearly realized what was missing and started to draft a proposal for an ongoing Youth As sembly for the United Nations. This assembly would be responsible for creating a committee to review and monitor the world-wide status of the *Convention on the Rights of the Child*. This document has become the most widely ratified human rights treaty in history a milestone in the struggle for children's rights. The Youth Assembly would also work within the Uniter Nations on identifying and tackling the global issue facing young people now and anticipating the issues of the future generation of youth.

It is my sincere belief that there couldn't be a bette time to unite the youth of the world to give them sense of purpose, to invite their input and to acknowledge it. The fact that such an Assembly has long bee overdue makes it even more appropriate to give the younger generations the chance to be a part of the greater Voice calling for peace.

Youth constitute roughly one quarter of the world population, yet are among the most neglected an troubled segments in the global society. Approx mately eighty-six percent of youth live in developin countries and consequently suffer from malnutritio and disease. Among those outside developing cour tries, many live in communities of broken families an

in cities where emotional solace is sought in gangs or through drugs.

For many generations now young people have been restless and lacked purpose. This has bred a sense of detachment which in turn results in indifference. If the restlessness could finally be harnessed, given the brilliance and boldness of youth, there could be a catalytic force capable of many wonders.

If this proposed Assembly provides a sense of unity and responsibility for only *some* of today's young people in the world, then there is hope in achieving progress towards peace and social change. Within a population of close to two billion young people on earth there is the potential for a dynamic force of creativity and change. That potential can be realized if their voices are heard.

The UN has spoken about youth involvement almost since its inception. Furthermore, the General Assembly has requested that all governments include youth representatives in their respective delegations, although only three have ever done so: Denmark, the Netherlands, and Norway.

Here is the vision: a partnership between the United Nations and representatives of young people from all over the world. This vision is widely supported by organizations such as The Lifebridge Foundation, the Foundation of America, the Earth Society Foundation, Peaceways, Pathways to Peace, World Citizen Diplomats, and One Day Foundation. The Youth Assembly proposal has also been adopted by the "We The Peoples" Initiative, a project begun in the early 1980's with the help of Dr. Robert Muller.

The One Day Foundation, located in Sedona, Arizona, was founded by young people and is planning an International Youth Conference for the fall of 1998. This conference will serve as a prototype for the Assembly and will bring together youth from around the world to discuss their views, ideas, and hopes for the future. It is proposed that it be attended by two young people from every country in the world. This International Youth Conference will provide a chance for the world's youth to share their thoughts with each other, UN officials, the media, and world leaders.

UN CORNER

Dr. Ida Urso's Report on The 50th Annual Conference of the United Nations' Department of Information (DPI) and Affiliated Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs)

From September 10th through September 13th at United Nations Headquarters a reported 2,245 participants attended the 50th annual conference organized by the United Nations' Department of Public Information in cooperation with the NGO/DPI Executive Committee. These participants were representing 637 organizations from 61 countries.

This year's conference theme, "Building Partnerships," explored, celebrated and sought to improve the vitality of the association between the United Nations and Non-Governmental Organizations—an association that has been evolving over the past

half century. Also explored were the ways in which new technologies and communications can facilitate the process of global cooperation at a level that has been previously impossible. Convening within the august General Assembly Hall, the opening session included an address by Secretary-General Kofi Annan who pointed to the profound changes over time that have occurred in the relationship between the United Nations and the NGOs. At its inception, the Member States of the United Nations were virtually the sole actors in the international process. Today however, NGOs play a significant role in deliberations, policy formulations and in the implementation of policies and projects.

Referring to the growing threat from the "new global enemies" including drug-traffickers, money-launderers and gun-runners, Mr. Annan stated that today practical cooperation is an imperative: "Member States, governmental and intergovernmental bodies and non-governmental organizations must work together in partnership." Acting on this belief, Mr. Annan suggested that NGOs consider holding a "People's Millennium Assembly" as a parallel to the Millennium Assembly of the United Nations.

Through a "video-salutation" the Russian-American Crew aboard the Mir Space Station greeted the participants of the NGO Conference. These three men emphasized the need in our world for partnerships and cooperation and for a recognition of our global responsibility for the fate of humanity and our planet. They also sent the NGOs a replica of the Roerich Banner of Peace.

NGOs are the "constituency of consciousness." Thus, stated Clovis Maksoud, Director of the Center for the

Global South at American University as he spoke on the last day of the conference on a panel focusing on the new trends in the work of NGOs and civil society. Dr. Maksoud referred to the many global issues such as human rights and the environment on which NGOs assiduously work. Attempting the resolution of global problems allows us to transcend the nation-state experience. It renders us part of a global citizenship that complements and humanizes the nation-state experience. He stated: we are no longer in international relations; rather, we are in "intersocietal relations, in interhuman relations."

Jose Ramos-Horta, The Nobel Peace Prize Laureate, echoed these sentiments. NGOs, he said, must be the watchdogs protecting us from the darker side of humanity which is responsible for 100 million deaths over the last century. This theme was repeated often as most of the conference speakers pointed to both the great opportunity and responsibility of NGOs. Secretary-General Kofi Annan encapsulated this theme most aptly in his tribute to NGOs: "For both the threatened and the threatening, it makes a difference to know that the world is watching, and that it cares."
